MOTOR VEHICLE LARCENIES ARE PREVENTABLE

Most thefts from motor vehicles are preventable. There are just a few things you need to do to prevent them. Once you realize the steps you need to take, we are counting on you to do them on a daily basis!

Practice T.L.C.:

Take Out Valuables If you can leave your valuables at home, do so. Otherwise, upon reaching your destination, take your valuables with you. If you must leave them in your vehicle, place them in the trunk before you get to your destination.



Close Doors & Windows An open door or window or window allows a thief a quick and quiet way to enter your vehicle. Take the time to ensure you closed everything.

COMMON ITEMS STOLEN FROM VEHICLES

You might be surprised by what victims make available to thieves:

- Cameras, Laptops, Cell **Phones**
- Car Stereos, Mail, CD's, Purses
- Vehicle Registrations, Money, Jackets
- Gym Bags, Luggage, Briefcases
- Garage Door Openers, Etc.

LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION!

You can often choose where you park your vehicle. It is important to be aware of where you park. Thieves are looking for vehicles they can enter with the least possibility of someone watching and alerting the police. Ideally, the best place to park is in your locked garage. Otherwise please consider these important factors:

- \Rightarrow **Don't** park where others can- \Rightarrow **Do** park in well-lit areas
- - not see your vehicle
- ⇒ Do join a Neighborhood Watch
- ⇒ Don't park in all-day unattended parking areas
- Do park in clearly visible areas



PREVENT BICYCLE AND LAWNMOWER THEFT

- * Be sure to lock your bicycle to a stationary object. The best locking device is a hardened steel u-shaped lock. (Avoid locks, chains or cables that can easily be cut or broken)
- Keep mower in a locked garage
- Make sure both wheels are locked and remove any accessories that can easily be taken
- * Record the makes, models, serial numbers and descriptions of your bicycles and lawnmowers. Store this information in a safe place.

TIPS TO INCREASE THE SECURITY OF YOUR YARD

- If you are working in the front yard, lock the back door and garage. If you are working in the backyard, lock the front door and garage.
- Don't keep ladders or other equipment in the yard that could be used to gain access to your home.
- Keep shrubs, bushes, hedges, and fences to a height of three feet or less.
- Solid fences can prevent neighbors from watching out for each other. Consider chain link or picket-type fencing.
- Residential lighting should be used to light up home entry points. Motion detector lights are an inexpensive deterrent for areas where continuous lighting is unnecessary.

SECURING THE INSIDE OF YOUR HOME



We are entering the season of leisurely activities and relaxing in the nice weather. Don't be lulled into complacency when it comes to securing your home! If you leave your windows open for ventilation when during the hot days, learn how to "pin" your windows. "Pinning" your windows al-

lows ventilation, but prevents a burglar from forcing it open further.

While on that welldeserved vacation, either stop your mail or ask a trusted neighbor to pick up your mail/papers and maintain your lawn. Use light timers which turn multiple lights on and off at predetermined times (copying your normal schedule).

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ORGANIZE A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

By getting to know your neighbors and forming connections, you make your community safer. You do this by learning to recognize what is normal and what is not. This can help you in protecting your property and family as well as that of your neighbors. Watch groups are also great social gatherings and may be used to form networks to help each other with home improvement projects which can raise property values. This is also a

great forum to discuss concerns and share ideas. Close friendships have been formed between members of a watch program.

HELP PROTECT OUR KIDS



Have your child observe the City of Lansing Curfew Hours (Ordinance 650.01). No person as listed below shall be upon any public street, highway, alley, park, vacant lot, or other public place between the following hours:

Under 12 years old: 10:00pm—6:00am

13 - 16 years old: 12:00am-6:00am

Help keep our kids safe by adhering to the Curfew Law. This helps reduce children becoming victims of crimes, in addition to the accessibility of children to commit crimes. We must all join together to look our for our children and our neighborhoods! Work with parents to monitor curfew hours in your neighborhood and call 911 to report any youth disturbances after curfew.



WHAT IS "OPERATION IDENTIFICATION"?P



- → Nationally recognized citizen's burglary prevention program in use for over 30 years
- → Allows law enforcement to detect, identify, and return stolen or lost property to its rightful owner
- → Operation ID involves marking or engraving property with an identifying number and displaying a window decal on your property.
- → Mark property with identifying mark, preferably your state abbreviation followed by Driver's License number.
- → Inventory the marked property on a form with descriptions including brand, model and serial numbers.
- Display Operation ID decals on house windows

FIREWORKS SAFETY TIPS

Fireworks are synonymous with our celebration of Independence Day. Yet, the thrill of fireworks can also bring pain. 200 people on average go the emergency room every day with

fireworksrelated injuries
in the month
around the July
4th holiday.

Follow these safety tips when using fireworks:



- device when lighting the fuse. Back up to a safe
 - distance immediately after lighting fireworks.
 - * Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.
 - * Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
 - Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.
 - Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.

FIREWORKS ORDINANCE (1615.02)

Consumer fireworks **shall not** be used in the City of Lansing without a license:

- On any day except the day preceding, day of, or day after a national holiday.
- Between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 8:00 am on the day preceeding, day of, or day after a national holiday.

- Never allow young children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- * Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities. Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees - hot
